Conclusion

Google AI provides the strong, academically sound "default" interpretation. It's the reading you would likely encounter in a university literature course.

ChatGPT, however, performs a more creative and analytical task. It not only understands the first position but pinpoints its underlying assumptions and offers a compelling, structuralist alternative. By re-centering the poem on a physical act (hiding in a bathroom) rather than just a mental state, it "unobscures" a plausible, if less common, reading that emphasizes Eliot's dark humor and narrative craft over pure psychological expression.
